TRUSTEES' REPORT For the year ended 31 March 2019

The Trustees present their report and accounts for the year ended 31 March 2019.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the charity's Memorandum and Articles of Association and comply with the Companies Act 2006 and the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP), "Accounting and Reporting by Charities Act 2011".

Structure, governance and management

The King's Cross -Brunswick Neighbourhood Association (KCB) is a charitable company limited by guarantee. The governance framework for the organisation is set out in the Memorandum and Articles of Association lodged with the Charities Commission and Companies House.

Recruitment and appointment of trustees

The organisation is governed by the Board of Trustees which consists of the Chair, the Vice Chair, the Treasurer and six representatives from the members, elected by the members at the Annual General Meeting.

All KCB Trustees must be residents of the King's Cross, Brunswick area. The Board of Trustees may also coopt two further persons whether members or not, until the conclusion of the next AGM.

Trustee Induction and training

All the new trustees undergo an induction programme and are supplied with an information pack covering the governance structure and the policies and procedures of the organisation. Voluntary Action Camden provides a series of training workshops on management committee roles and responsibilities and trustees are encouraged to attend.

Risk Management

The Board of Trustees have conducted a review of major risks to which the charity may be exposed.

External Risks:

The significant external risk is that of reduction of funding. The Board of Trustees have developed a Reserves Policy to address any sudden withdrawal of core funding and are working towards implementing this fully as soon as possible. The Board of Trustees has developed a strategy that allows for diversification of funding for activities.

Internal Risks:

Financial risks are minimised by the implementation of procedures for authorisation of all transactions and projects and to ensure consistent quality of service for all operational aspects of the charitable company. These procedures are consistently reviewed to ensure they continue to meet the needs of the charity.

The potential loss of key personnel is minimised by offering staff career enhancing training, structured supervision, annual appraisal and paying the market value for their post.

Potential risks to clients and users is minimised by ensuring all staff and volunteers complete a Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS) check before working unsupervised with any clients and users.

Potential risk to Trustees is minimised by insurance cover.

Objectives and Activities

KCB was established to pursue charitable objectives. The organisation aims to work to improve the welfare and quality of life of the inhabitants of the King's Cross and Brunswick area of the London Borough of Camden. The organisation is a registered charity (registration number 1083901).

Review of activities for the past year

The past year has again been a very challenging year for KCB. There are more demands for our services due to the various national policy changes, benefit changes impacting our service users and there are also more demands for the reduced level of funds that are available for the charity sector.

However, we never give up as an organisation and still continue to provide excellent services for our community.

Most of our services are provided from the Chadswell Healthy Living Centre, King's Cross Neighbourhood Centre and the Marchmont Community Centre, which we lease from Camden Council. All three of our community centres are fully accessible and we have lots of disabled older people, some in wheel chairs attending our regular activities at Marchmont Community Centre including Pilates, chair based exercise sessions, Bingo, lunch club and the Computer suite where we provide free computer access for local residents.

In the past year the organisation has worked with children, young people, older people, Bangladeshi families, Somali families, Chinese families and refugee families. Our work with young people has received a lot of positive publicity locally and nationally. Our work has tackled inequality, created opportunities and transformed lives.

The work that has been done has included community safety, employment training, advice, guidance, and health promotion, work to support community cohesion and challenge racism and inequality. This has been a more challenging year as a lot of our big grants had ended but fortunately for us we have been able to get new grants to replace them.

The organisation was also involved in organising the Camden Mela which was attended by 4-5 people including people from black and minority ethnic communities, lesbian, gay, bi-sexual and transgender community. There were children, young people, adults, older people including people with disabilities. Our key guests included Sir Keir Starmer MP, Councillor Georgia Gould, Leader of Camden Council, Mayor of Camden and various Cabinet members and Councillors. They all spoke about the excellent work that KCB does in supporting vulnerable and disadvantaged members of our community and promoting social and community cohesion.

This year there has been an increase in youth violence in Camden and our youth service has been exceptional in supporting young people, keeping them safe and offering opportunities for them to increase their knowledge, skills and improve attitudes.

We have had lots of new, innovative and dynamic activities for the older people including the days out to Kew Gardens, Buckingham Palace and shopping trips which has been very popular and our partnership with Hopscotch and Bengali Worker's Association supporting Bangladeshi older people with funding from Ageing Better Camden has helped hundreds of older people.

KCB has once again exceeded all of its' quantitative and qualitative targets in all areas of work. The monitoring returns and feedback received from service users demonstrates that KCB was successful in improving the social and emotional development of the local residents and improving their quality of life.

The support of our staff team and volunteers has been invaluable, without which we would not have been able to offer such an extensive variety of activities and projects throughout the year. We would like to thank all the volunteers and staff members.

KCB has excellent relations with statutory, voluntary sector partners and charities. KCB has extensive partnership arrangements with the London Borough of Camden.

Our main funders this year are the London Borough of Camden, the Big Lottery, The Henry Smith Charity, City Bridge Trust, John Lyon's Charity, St Andrew Holborn Charities, St Pancras Thanet Trust and BBC Children in Need. We also received small amounts of funding from various other funders. We would like to thank all the funders for their generosity and support.

The funds raised during the year have been applied prudently to meet the Charity's objectives. All assets are held for the organisation to carry out its' normal charitable and administrative activities.

Transaction and Financial Position

The statement of financial activities shows income for the year of £540,845 with expenditure of £521,810 leaving a profit of £19,035. At the end of this year we carry forward unrestricted reserves of £234,313.

Reserves Policy

In line with Charity Commission recommendations the KCBNA Board of Trustees aim to achieve a level of unrestricted reserve which is sufficient to cover 6 months operating costs and 6 months staff salary costs. The current estimated operating costs per annum is £223,176. The sum identified for reserves is £111,588. The current estimated salary cost is £298,634. The sum identified for reserves is £149,317. The total sum identified for reserves is therefore £260,905. At present the unrestricted reserves do not reach this target. The Board of Trustees are considering ways in which additional unrestricted funds may be raised.

Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities

The Trustees are aware that Company law requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Charity and of its incoming resources and application of resources, including its income and expenditure for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the directors are required to

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles of the charities SORP;
- make judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare the financial statements on a going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the company will continue in business.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the Charity and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Statement as to Disclosure of Information to Independet Examiner

So far as the Trustees are aware, there is no relevant information of which the charitable company's Independent examiners are unaware, and each trustee has taken all the steps that he or she ought to have taken as a trustee in order to make himself or herself aware of any relevant audit information and to establish that the charity's auditors are of that information.
